This was a marriage of first cousins. John's father, was older brother of Martha's father Robert BAMBRIDGE. See charts (a) and (g).

Edward and Amelia had all their children baptised in St John and All Saints, Hertford.

In 1841, Edward was an excise officer at Mulberry Green Harlow. In 1851 he was innkeeper at the Queen's Head, Harlow. In 1861, he was innkeeper at the Green Man, Mulberry Green, Harlow. His status (in 1861) was "Mar" but his wife was absent - she possibly died in 1857 (see her note). In 1871, age 60, now with "Wid" status, he was a farmer of 80 acres employing 4 men and 2 boys, in Mulberry Green.

Amelia was baptised in 1812 at St Mary, Huntingdon daughter of John & Judith STAPLES. There is a death of an Amelia BAMBRIDGE in 1857, December quarter, Epping registration district, which is probably Amelia, but may instead be her daughter.

In 1881, William BAMBRIDGE, 33, was hotel keeper and farmer of 10 acres, with 4 men employed, at the Green Man Inn, 15 Mulberry Green, Harlow. With him were his wife Emily BAMBRIDGE, age 24, his daughter Emily BAMBRIDGE (11 months), and 8 servants including 4 grooms and a page boy.

In 1861, John was an Inland Revenue officer while still at home with his father at the Green Man, Mulberry Green, Harlow. In 1871, John was innkeeper at the Saw & Whalebone, Latton, Essex employing 7 men and 2 boys which included 6 grooms and 2 jockeys. In 1881, he was licensed vitualler at the Eagle Tavern, Eagle Terrace, Edmonton.

In 1901, age 50, the widowed Martha was boarding house keeper at 232 S. Lambeth Road, Lambeth, with 10 boarders ages 11 to 40, as well as having 3 of her daughters (Pattie, Amelia and Katie) at home.

Emily's parents were John CAWDRY (spelling variable in the records), of All Cannings, Wiltshire, and Frances (Fanny) CLEVERLY of Heddington, Wiltshire. They married in 1836 in All Cannings. In 1871, John was a beerhouse keeper in High Street, Wroughton, Wiltshire, with his wife and children including Emily who was age 15. After Emily's husband, William, died in 1887, she took over at the Green Man, and was there in 1891 and 1901.
